PROTECTION OF RIGHTS 4

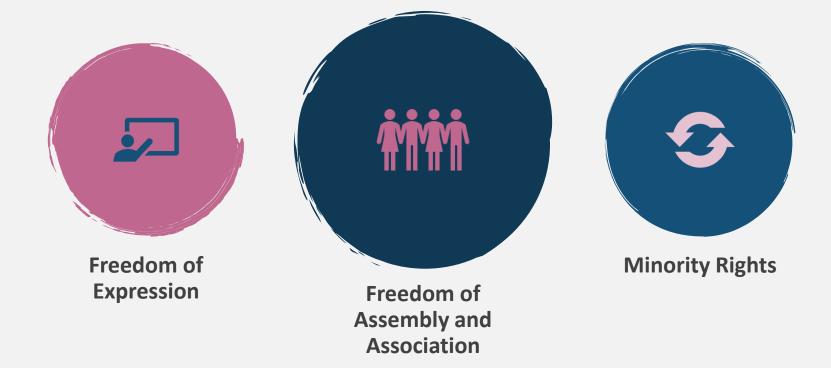

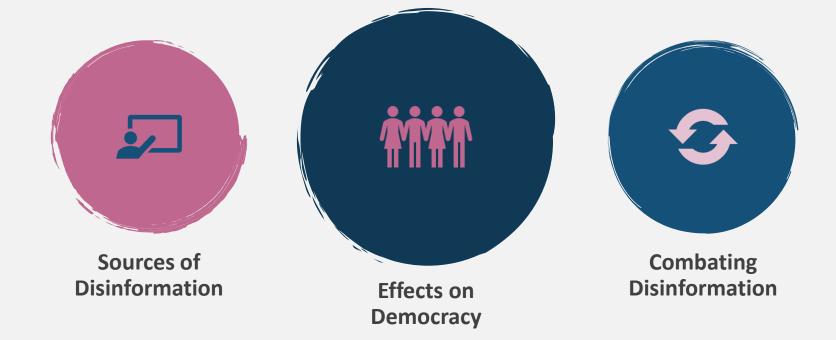
